

San Francisco Celebrates the Centennial of James Joyce's *Ulysses*

n Feb. 2, 1922, James Joyce's masterpiece, *Ulysses*, was published and the literary world was never the same. Each year, Joyce fans around the globe come together on June 16, the day on which *Ulysses* is set, to commemorate the Irish author's life. Known as Bloomsday, the celebration is named after the book's protagonist, Leopold Bloom. This June, the

The Global Library Project

he Global Library Project documents in photographs the important role of libraries throughout the world. This exhibition grew out of Robert Dawson's 18-year photographic survey of public libraries in the United States. It features libraries across Canada, Europe and the Middle East, including Israel, Palestine, Germany, Ukraine, Russia and other European countries. The Global Library Project showcases the famous refugee camp in France "The Jungle" to Holocaust-haunted former synagogues turned into libraries in Poland to libraries in what is now a war zone in Ukraine and, finally, a Russian State Library for young adults in Moscow.

Dawson illustrates how libraries engage and

support an informed citizenry by providing access to information. Of particular interest to the project is how social, cultural, historical and political issues have shaped a library's role in each community. The show is sponsored by Independent Arts and Media, a nonprofit, charitable organization based in San Francisco.







Preserving LGBTQ Historical Highlights through the DIGI Center

SFPL's DIGI Center is proud to host "Preserving LGBTQ Historical Highlights," a collection of newly-digitized archives from the James C. Hormel LGBTQIA and San Francisco History Centers, made possible by a grant from the California State Library's Preserving California LGBTQ History program. From police surveillance photographs of queer and sex-oriented businesses to the scrapbook of a lesbian bar raid, this digital collection showcases and preserves the experiences of LGBTQ San Franciscans in the 20th century. The collection also features personal photographs, SFPD photo negatives and Harvey Milk's hand-annotated speeches and "Political Will" audio cassette recording.

Here's a roundup of our best subscription databases for LGBTQIA research, which you can access instantly with your SFPL card.

Archives of Sexuality and Gender spans from the 16th to 20th centuries, with the largest digital collection of primary-source publications relating to the study of sex, sexuality and gender. Learn about the groundbreaking work of local gay-rights activists Phyllis Lyon and Del Martin, who founded the Daughters of Bilitis, the first national lesbian organization in the United States.

Contemporary Women's Issues covers the topics that influence people's lives everywhere through the lens of women involved in civil rights, education, entrepreneurship and more. Use the graphical Topic Finder to focus searches and discover related terms.

GenderWatch provides authoritative perspectives from 1970 to the present day. Choose from 300 titles containing more than 220,000 articles on the topics of sexuality, religion, feminism, masculinity and more. Discover essential titles like *Off Our Backs* and *Transgender Tapestry*, as well as community newspapers and international publications.

LGBTQ+ Source has an impressive collection of prominent LGBTQ+ publications, such as *The Advocate* and *The Bay Area Reporter*. Use the specialized thesaurus to reveal thousands of LGBTQ+ terms.



Juneteenth and Beyond: A Celebration of Black Liberation

n June 2021, President Joe Biden signed the Juneteenth National Independence Day Act into law. The now federal holiday has been celebrated annually on June 19 across the United States since 1865 and commemorates the emancipation of enslaved Black people.

To honor this historical moment, Black history and Black culture, the African American Center has curated an exhibit at the Grove St. entrance of the Main Library. The display includes photos dating back to early Juneteenth celebrations, as well as images from more recent celebrations from the Bay Area and around the United States. The display includes information about the history of Juneteenth as well as
