## Have Fun and Grow at Our Children's Center Learning Jubilee



**Udemy** – This platform offers over 14,000 online video courses which are constantly being updated. There are classes in 12 different languages as well, so you can learn in a language you prefer.



**Brainfuse** – Stuck on a tough calculus problem? Need help writing a paper? Want to learn how to play chess better? Brainfuse has tutors and teachers who can help you LIVE! Available for all ages.

## Collections Corner:

### Setting the Stage for the Riot Grrrls: Tour Our Frightwig Collection

The San Francisco History Center is thrilled to announce that the Cecilia Kuhn Frightwig Collection (SFH 668) is available for research. This collection contains material collected by Frightwig's longtime drummer, Cecilia Kuhn. Frightwig is a feminist punk band, founded in 1982, which inspired bands like Hole, Bikini Kill and L7, and is credited with being an inspiration for the Riot Grrrl movement of the 1990s. The collection contains show fliers, photographs, posters, clippings, magazines, newspapers and zines, tour journals and ephemera. Of note is a 31-page journal entry documenting Frightwig's European tour with D.O.A. in 1985.

What makes this place really special is the friendships and bonds that we see the teens making on a regular basis."

"Button-making is one of my favorite activities. It looks complicated, but is quick and easy to master and I love seeing how creative people get with their button art."

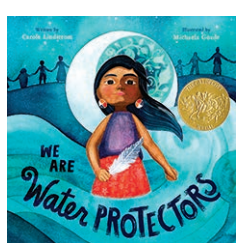

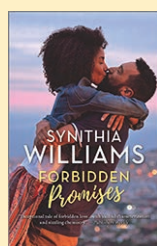
### *Island Queen* by Vanessa Riley

## Film Double Feature Highlights Watershed Moments in Transgender History



**A**ugust is Transgender History Month. In 2021, San Francisco became the first city in the country to officially dedicate a whole month to celebrating, remembering and uplifting transgender history. Transgender History Month commemorates the Compton Cafeteria Riots, in which transgender and gender-nonconforming customers of a Tenderloin eatery, led by transgender women of color, fought back against police harassment. We celebrate the transgender activists who paved the way for all of us to be more free with a screening of two acclaimed films, both made by transgender filmmakers.

**Happy Birthday, Marsha!** is a film about iconic transgender artist and activist, Marsha "Pay it No Mind" Johnson, and her life in the hours before she ignited the 1969 Stonewall Riots in New York City. (NR, 14min., 2017)

**Screaming Queens: The Riot at Compton's Cafeteria** tells the little-known story of the first known act of collective, violent resistance to the social oppression of queer people in the United States—a 1966 riot in San Francisco's Tenderloin neighborhood, three years before the famous gay riot at New York's Stonewall Inn. (NR, 56 min., 2005)

# Youth Engaged in Library Leadership



## YELL in the Spotlight: What SFPL's Interns Were Up to This Summer

**Y**outh Engaged in Library Leadership (YELL) interns returned to the Excelsior, Mission, Portola, Sunset, West Portal and Main libraries this summer. These teens worked together to explore library resources, discussed how the library can better serve teens and created content for young people interested in the arts, social justice, literacy, nature, sustainability and wellness. Interns contributed to community impact projects intended to inform and influence library services for teens. Their projects were presented at the Library as pop-up events or make-and-take craft kits.

YELL interns at our Portola, Sunset, West Portal branches and The Mix at The Main created visual and digital art pieces to express their personal identities

and to tell their stories. The Mission YELL interns, propelled by their curiosity about nature, sustainability and wellness, designed a virtual workshop on natural cleaning products and tools inspired by their walkthroughs of the Mission District.

Finally, the Excelsior YELL interns were interested in the topics of mental health and mindfulness—resulting in their conceptualizing and construction of DIY activities intended to promote calmness and serenity.

And there's more: Our teens created PSAs to focus on what the library means to them and attended college and life skills workshops with Study Smart Tutors. And to highlight what they love most about the library, teens compiled recommendations on books, library tools and other community resources. We sat down with a few of our interns to find out, in their own words, what was special about their experience at SFPL.

**When you think about the Library, what are you curious about and what do you want to learn? Why?**

*"I think of [the library] as a safe, peaceful place to get work done and spend quiet break time from the usual busy schedule. It is a place where many students whose parent work late or are in need of resources can have access to those things."*

*"I see the library as a place to gather and connect with your community where you can share experiences and work together to learn and create. I want to learn more about social issues, how they affect community members and how we as young individuals can work and collaborate in a group to help make a difference in our local communities. I believe that everyone should be educated on issues that affect them and their community because awareness is the first step to bringing about substantial change. Being aware helps people understand our society better, equipping them with the knowledge to make their own informed decisions and to take the best action."*

*"I would like to start a book club at the library and spread literature to the younger kids in the community. I feel the transition to digital options isn't inherently harmful, but studies have shown that physical reading is incredibly beneficial to young ones."*

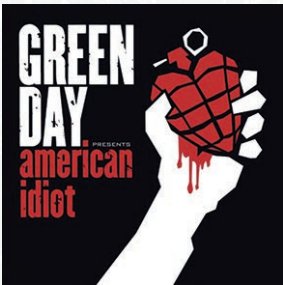

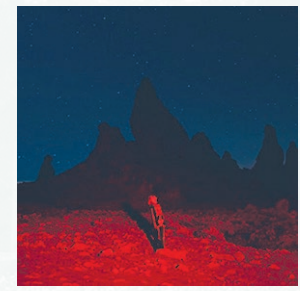
### This Old Dog, Mac DeMarco

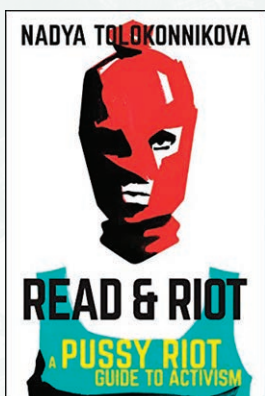


### Punisher, Phoebe Bridgers

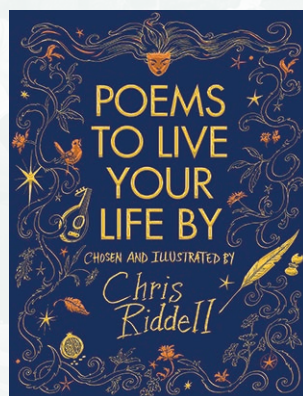

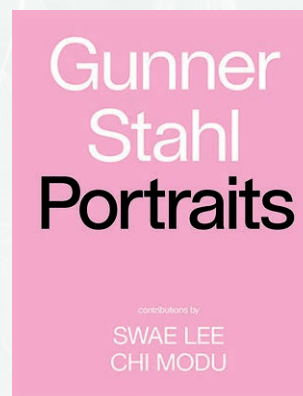

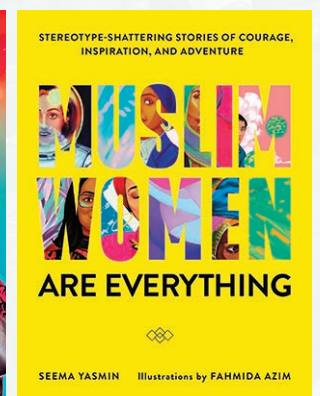

### tanea lunsford lynx:

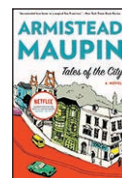

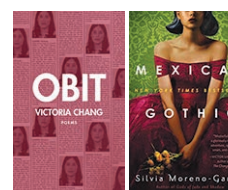
### Lindsey J. Smith:

### Douglas Henderson:

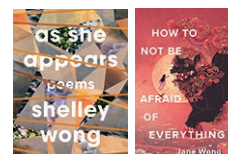

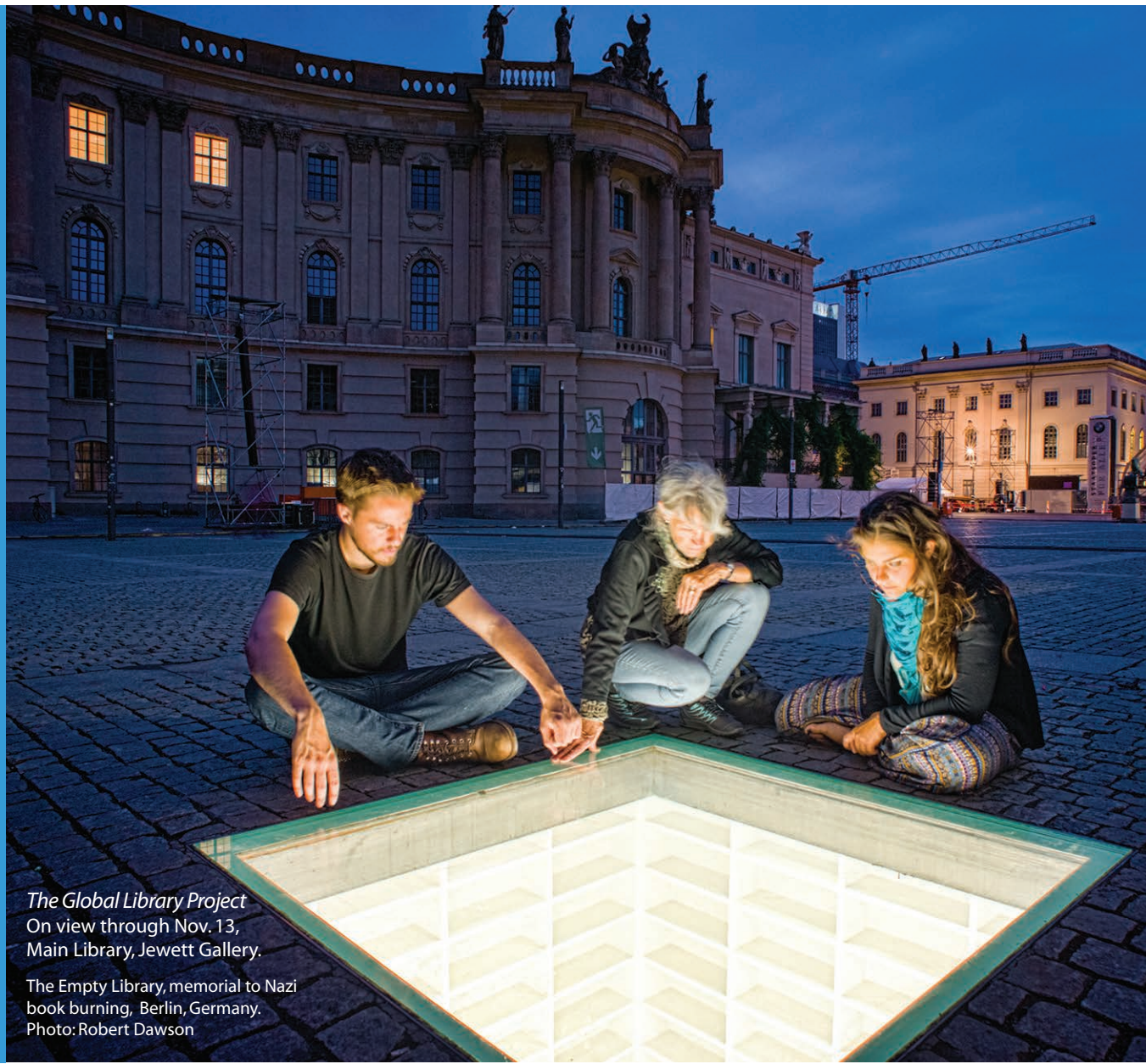
